so much occupied with bell ringing - "C. and" - Stella

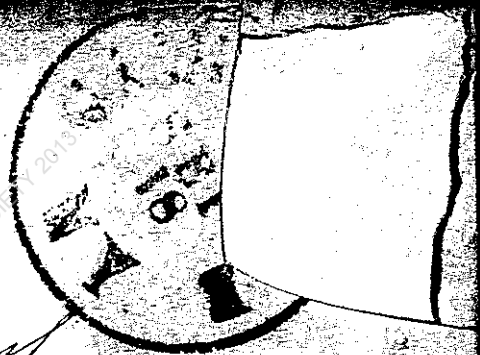
