

Concord O. August 2<sup>nd</sup> / 63

Sunday Noon -

Darling,

I have only a few moments to write you before getting ready for church. Mrs Shultz just brought up a letter for me to send to you for Jake. Will you please read and answer for him to them. They do not seem alarmed about him and I did not mean they should be. Your letter of the 25<sup>th</sup> reached here Friday night and of the 26<sup>th</sup> last night I was so sorry to hear you were not well but I have been fearing it for some time. Be very careful my husband. I know you are all to one and my happiness and life are all bound up in yours. Keep up good heart love and I will send you cheery letters just as often as I can. I think I can manufacture

such a garment as you want  
at least I shall make a great  
effort to do so and hope I shall  
succeed. I think I have the  
idea of what you want. I wish  
you had it now, if it is so warm  
as it is here. I think I never  
suffered with heat as I did just  
day. Every article of clothing was  
a burden except hoses. You  
shall have the "blue shirt", "sears" and  
I will make it as nice as possible  
I will send you towels, socks, &c.  
&c and would be happy to do  
anything else that I could.  
I wish you had the onions and  
vinegar now. You shall have a  
goodly supply of them. I shall expect  
to see your father down here soon  
but I guess I won't go to Cleveland  
with him. Our folks are all sick  
excepting myself which is very unfortu-  
nate just now. While Ellen is here

and expecting every attention from  
I get along fearfully though so dan-  
gerous bad. I do get some strength  
times if I have to cook in the  
kitchen getting dinner when it is  
warm enough where there is no  
fire to enlighten a person. Miller  
has had the Dr. and been quite  
seriously ill, but is getting better.  
It is something extraordinary for  
him that he ever quite closed up  
a time. Tell Jake he may expect  
something in your box if there is  
room which we will try to have.  
Samuel is much better. He has  
a letter from him this week. The  
rumor of amputation was quite  
unfounded. He hopes soon to join  
his Reg<sup>t</sup>. Ellen and I are gone  
to church to-day. Father has broken  
the colt and got a nice silver-  
mounted harness for her and she  
goes so nicely and looks splendid.

I am glad you like Angie's likeness  
It is a good one. I'm sure you get  
the scolding I don't feel bad about  
it though I am so sorry that  
the note was sent when you are  
sick. Don't feel worried about  
anything, just feel happy and get  
well as soon as possible. I  
feared to clay me with letters about

Oh you cannot tell how much  
good they do me. I shall make  
arrangements to go to Cleveland  
to stay in about a month if nothing  
happens to prevent. I think you  
will laugh some over this little  
note. I think it about the entire  
thing further over done. Has seemed  
to buying it myself. It is time  
to prepare for church and I  
must leave you now for I want  
this to be left in the P.O. today so  
it may go out tomorrow. I will  
write more when I come back if  
I can get time - All send love  
and hopes for your speedy recovery
