During a part of '62 & '63 I was a member of Co G, 105th V. I., and in the years that have elapsed since that time there has not remained within me a warm remembrance, for his many acts of kindness, of my 1st Lieutenant, who bore the same name as yourself.

I read, with great interest, the books from the pen of Judge Albion N. Frazier, also was a regular reader of "Our Continent" during its publication, and have often wondered if you were all one and the same person. In a perusal of

The National Tribune Washington D.C. of
a recent issue, I saw your name and present
address, and resolved to settle the matter by writing
you. There is a Dr Moore (dentist), ^{now} who said
he was well acquainted with Judge Abner H. Morgan
in North Carolina, and from his description I
thought I recognized the portrait of my 1st Lieutenant.

As I stated before, I have the memory of many acts
of kindness and consideration through him as my
superior officer, which I shall retain as long as life
lasts. It would give me great pleasure to hear from
him, to learn the facts of his life and pleasant ones to
him and his, and utter a fervent - God bless him,

If you are he whom I am seeking, I would
ask if you could give the date of capture and
parole in '63, by Morgan, of a detail under
Capt Casfield, on a foraging expedition out
of Murfreesboro Tenn.?
