My Dear Judge Tourgee:

Yours of the 26th is at hand this morning. I am perfectly willing to have you associate Mr. Gooch with me in the harness patent; or, if you wish, to let him take entire charge, either in my name or in his own. Or, I am willing to have you take the other course you suggest, and recast the whole, and file it in my name in that way. I certainly should be very sorry to have you leave the papers in any shape not entirely satisfactory to yourself, and would not have sent them on for signature, unless I had supposed them to be so.

While the differences between us are not, I think, so great as you imagine, you understand of course that my opinion is not a mere literary preference for my own words, but is founded on a real fear that in the forms you favored there are legal dangers to your possible interests. But you are the patient. If you don't like the taste of our medicine, pour it out the window. We shall not be offended.
