Judge Saungee. Old Comrade.

I am an old Andersonville prisoner taken in the battle of Chickamauga, and confined in Richmond, Danville and Andersonville, till the close of the war. Health is broken, yet no visible appearances of disease. I had the scurvy at Andersonville and came near dying there. I draw a pension of \$4.00 per month, for which I am thankful, but this is not sufficient to take care of me, and so I am writing a pamphlet entitled "The Errors of Rebel Prisons," containing the Autobiography of Jefferson Davis by himself and the Weekly InterOcean both, and 'Bystanders Notes', also an account of his funeral &c; his article in the Seminary and Richmond numbers

of Belford's Magazine, 1890. together
with editorial comments thereon
from the Enter Ocean, and my own
story of prison life. Can you
inform me where I can get the
report of the Congressional
Committee on the treatment of
prisoners, also any facts in your
possession in regard to Mr Davis
would be gratefully received.

He tells a slick story, but veracity
and him never lived very close
together, but all are not aware
of this fact. Yours fraternally
