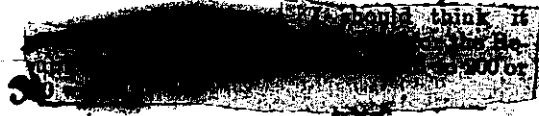
Mrs H. joins me and you will be pleased to know her and call her friend. I am in full sympathy with your great work. Yours
