Dear Madam;—

I have just returned home from a trip of several days and find your order for the markers. This is all right and we will get the markers out and send them along with the monument. As I understand it they are to be 8 inches wide, 4 inches thick and 6 or 7 inches high above ground, with no polish. Just the initials in sunken letters on top and the dates in sunken letters on the face; simply the one year with each marker.

I think these markers will look much better to make them 8 inches wide and I will make them so. We did not include in the price of five dollars (\$5.00) any lettering for the face of the markers as your sketch showed simply the initials on top. For the twelve figures on the face I will have to have twenty cents each. This will make the three markers cost seventeen dollars and forty cents (\$17.40), and I tell you truly that at this price I will scarcely get a new dollar for an old one but am glad to do it to make them with the monument and will try and please you in every respect.

It seems to me, as it has all along, that these markers, even at 8 inches wide are going to look very small to go with the monument but if you are sure that they are just what you want, of course that is all right. Would be glad to hear from you just once more assuring me that I understand just how you want them and I enclose stamped envelope for that purpose. Sorry to trouble you so much but will try to please you in the end.

In a former letter you ask about the possibility of getting a photograph of the monument. It would certainly not be possible for us to photograph the monument until it is in the cemetery for you can very readily see that to set up the monument in our yards would require almost as much labor as to set it up in the cemetery.

We do not set up these monuments before they are shipped but as the several pieces are finished we box them ready to freight. Trust this explanation will be satisfactory and beg to remain,
