JOHN PAUL JONES

- July 6, 1747.—Born at Arbigland, Scotland, the son of a gardener named Paul.
- 1773-1775.—Resided in Virginia and North Carolina.
- December 7, 1775.—Commissioned 1st Lieutenant of the Continental Navy.
- June 14, 1777.—Ordered to command the "RANGER." The "Stars and Stripes" were adopted by Congress the same day.
- February 14, 1778.—Received from French Admiral the first salute by a foreign power to the "Stars and Stripes."
- April 24, 1778.—Captured H. B. M. S. DRAKE off Carrickfergus after a fight of sixty-five minutes.
- August 14, 1779.—Sailed from Groix with BON HOMME RICH-ARD and squadron for coast of Scotland.
- September 23, 1779.—After four hours fighting by moonlight captured H. B. M. S. SERAPIS off Flamborough Head, England.
- May 19, 1788.—Ordered to command Russian fleet off Sebastopol. June 7, 1788.—Defeated Turkish fleet.
- July 18, 1792.—Died at residence, No. 42 Rue de Tournon, and body buried in Protestant Cemetery in Paris.
- April 14, 1905.—Ambassador Porter announced that the body of John Paul Jones had been found and identified.
- July 8, 1905.—Delivery of body to Rear Admiral Sigsbee, U. S. N.
- July 24, 1905.—Body deposited in the vault at the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland.
- April 24, 1906.—Commemorative ceremonies in the armory of the United States Naval Academy, at the conclusion of which the body will be taken in procession to the niche prepared for its reception in Bancroft Hall, where the exercises of the day will be concluded with prayers by the Chaplain of the Naval Academy.
