My dear Mr Nelson:

I did not know these articles were gone until several weeks after you vacated the Apartment, and then I thought to see you on the street sometime when I could tell you about them, but I have been away from Mayville much of the time for the last three months and have failed to meet you. There were two of the buttons gone from the electric fixtures--one in the parlor and one in the pink bedroom, which you should have replaced as the Apartment was to be left as to these things as you found it and these were intact when you came in. I find you also took away the shelves Dr Granger had put up by the sink. As they were placed there without a specification that they were to be removed, I am informed that they belonged to the Apartment and should not have been removed, especially as the wall has been marred. As Dr Granger still owes me \$5.00, on his rent which his father-in-law, Mr Cooper, said should be paid, but makes no reply to my demands for the same, I should have made claim on these shelves, had I had any thought that you would take them away.

These are all very small matters, Mr Nelson, but you may yourself be a landlord some day, though never again a tenant, and I thought you would not object to knowing these little things, and that landlords had rights as well as tenants. See?
