Yours of the 18th July
I have. I have no recollection
of your having given me a
memorandum of consular
fees due your husband at time
of his death. I remember
however that at the Hotel
Normandie, when I called upon
you, you mentioned such fees
as being due your husband
and I remember too that I
told you, that you would receive

sent me a power of attorney and I began

For this amount I enclose draft on New York - for
M^r. Dicot informs me that you will receive the
money to pay his expenses going and returning from
Paris. The translations were his work, he informed,

anything that was due.
M^r. Dicot assures me that
you gave him no memorandum
such as you mention.
There is no case pending
here in which you could
have a possible interest -
with the exception of the
Journal of matter, which I
succeeded in forcing to settle -
ment after considerable
labor and a personal visit
to Paris. This case had hung
fire, (if you will pardon the
expression) for several years
and practically nothing was
accomplished. Shortly after I
assumed charge here, the

Since the first day of July last Congress
are forbidden by law to obtain any part of the
funds - official or unofficial. The draft herewith
therefore closes your account with this office.
No other cases except the one mentioned have
been settled - and if they ever come to settlement,
the francs will be turned into the Treasury as provided
by law.
