Replying to your valued inquiry of the 13th permit us to say that the only variety on your list that we are unable to furnish is the Longhurst peach and as a substitute we would recommend the Wheatland which fruits in September, late, and which is a very desirable variety being most hardy and fruit of excellent quality. You will find a description of it in our catalogue. The Niagara we have quite a planting of. It originated in our adjoining county and in this locality is considered of great value. We have only been growing it recently but have some fine handsome trees this Spring. We will quote you the following prices,

- Peaches, \$2.50 per dozen,
- Quinces 75¢ each,
- Currant bushes \$1.50 per dozen
- Rhubarb roots \$2.00 per dozen

Asparagus plants \$3.00 per 100. If 25 Asparagus plants is all that is wanted we would put them in at the 100 rate.
