My dear Mr King: I have your
favor of yesterday at this mome-
ment rec'd.

You will excuse me if I say
that you are laboring under
a gross misapprehension about
the chair in controversy.

I am sure I never said that
this chair did not belong to me
I did say I did not think it was
the particular chair I asked
for. - but that it was a part of
a set of which I had the sofa &
other pieces in my home in ^{Paris} and
could not have been bought
by Mr Henry Howard at the break-
ing up of the Consular office in
New York as it was never in that
office. The furnishings of the Judge's
office and my own in Philadelphia
belonged to myself and the Judge
