I have tried to correct some of the most glaring historical inaccuracies. In view of the stress laid on Judge Tourgee's "lack of legal experience," I was glad to find among his papers the Certificate of admission to the Ohio bar, of date May 1863, and of that to the Supreme Court of the United States in April 1867.
