Dear Mr Cimperly:

I am very sorry to bother you so much, but I am extremely bothered myself that the Telephone Company have not carried out their agreement and know of no other way to get at them only through you. You said Mr Howard would do the repairing of the locks and fix the doors--that is return them and put them in place. Nothing of the kind has been done. I find that both the water faucets were taken away and all the shelves from one of the closets. This they have no right to do and I shall replace them and put in my bill to the Telephone Company. I have already paid out \$3.75 for cleaning and disinfecting the building with sundry other items which I shall include, such as soap, brush, gasoline, etc. I shall look to you to see that the bill is paid. Mr Erickson said he would furnish the faucets and have the water turned on as Mr Honeysett has moved in to-day.
