Dear Sir -

At the time your Honor enquired if there were any special reasons for continuing the restraining order in favour of Mr Crump I was very much engaged in an important case requiring immediate attention & I failed therefore to think of and suggest what I ought to have brought to your attention. There are growing crops of wheat, oats, &c, on the plantations of Crump, Fancette & others, which will be exposed to stock if the ford or rather the approaches to it are now opened & the river bridges cannot well be built now. I wish to suggest therefore if you dissolve the restraining order before a decision by the Supreme Court, if you cannot so modify it, as to authorize Mr Crump to keep a gate & require persons to shut it when they pass.
