My Dear wife:

I did not hear from you this morning and I am in consequence very fearful that something worse has befallen you than when you wrote. I have been very restless and uneasy and if I had not so much to do could not endure it. I sat last night until 11.30 - and the night before until 10.15 without supper - One of the murder cases has been continued and the other comes on to-morrow - This evening we try the case of rape. We have trial two or three very important civil cases and I think will get nearly through the civil docket by Sat. night. - I shall come home then anyhow and do not intend to come back next week - I do hope you will be well - I cannot endure the idea of your illness during my absence - I had a long walk this morning over on the beautiful hills across the river - The Okonitha which I have spent of - and enjoyed it

not a little I do wish we had
a little cottage on one of them and
just over two acres to live in it -

I wonder if we could sometime
have such a little Eden all to ourselves
and enjoy it without a care for the
mean harsh heartless world below?
