My dear wife:

I got here last night at
about 9 P. M. Found them not expecting me
and very solicitous as to your health - I can't
make it seem right for me to have come in

There are several things about the work

3 - You had better keep on hunting dirt and
manure as long as it is dry - The only
ground the pigs like is ash and then slush

The dirt from about the new house. If it

waste lumber about the house and pick up
the lumber and shingles - Sticking the lumber
well - Perhaps he had better help himself
out the manure -
