I have a recollection
that I cited the doctrine in Green v Lane
8 Fed. Eq. 70 & Prob. Eq. 102 - 15 you, upon arguing
the Chancery case to which you refer.

You have shown no light in the Presidential

we will soon be ourselves, & therefore to be little used
of speculation about it. So far as I understand your
views, they are, that, as the votes have not yet been
counted, the matter is perplexed with doubt, - but that,
so far as you can see, if Grant does not receive a major

your question before - but upon the little consideration
I have afforded the political outlook, I agree with you,
in substance.
