

Kingsville July 19. 1873

Dear Emma

Your letter of the 11th is
not at hand and perhaps by
the time this reaches you you may
be gone to A. C.

I have always feared the
effect of Quinine on the other
one but supposed removing it
might be as bad. I think I
know it now after some ex-
perience.

I suppose the trouble
to have inflammation or edema
will not be over for some time.

Get me back from you then
as Philadelphia is always the
best place to get news from
in this country.

I would come here

for a few days were it not
for two things want of time and
funds

We are just commencing
haying and harvest (that there is
of it) and for three weeks
we have only had about 2 days
sun to work to work and hope
that no rain of any account since
April.

We have had a strange
winter and spring for us

When I got your letter about
the Apples about Nov 14 we had
had no wind weather to speak of
that night it froze 3 or 4 inches
deep with 3/4 the Apples and hundreds
of Acres of Potatoes under an exposure
so they were lost.

The next day it began
to snow but every one expected
an open spell before winter set

in to do up their work but
the ground was not entirely bare
until April and but a few days
did the Mercury go as high as forty
you see at once where we
all were with snow from one to
2 1/2 feet deep for 4 or 5 months and
by the corn in the fields finally
began at the bottom.

The Apple crop in one field as
there was no way to dispose of
them at any price a very few
being picked and bared at 60 or
65¢ per bushel but the Potatoes ¹⁰⁰⁰ were
severely hit some in town being
as high as 4 or 500¢ a bushel by it them
and lots of corn was in the field
until April and nearly lost

We have made an arrangement with
a man who had purchased a few
bushels of apples and put them in
the cellar for some to send you

but there was no time to stir
him, until he took to the water
any thing

the ^{real} ^{time} ^{efforts} of getting
stock through the winter was
great, it not quite double what
it usually is

But we are ^{struggling}
at least with many thousands

able now all rain may cause
some of the corn & sorghum will be
a little out of season, but fear
not we will get some stand it as
well as we can

we sent the old black
dog day thought it about 20 so

Get me hear as often as
you can and I remain
