

Greenboro N.C., Sept 21st 1850
Wednesday 2 P.M.

My dear husband,

I have managed to get our clothes down after a fashion and have just sent them down to the Dr. Officer and you will get them to trust in the morning. I have gone all day that we are sick as you have done. I appear in the report of the proceedings yesterday in the Convention and we are usually reported as saying or doing something. I trust my name is soundless.

I have been feeling miserable all day and yesterday with the back ache. I had an hour or two in pain, I had some let up this afternoon and for the night I was

Mr. Brown came up to look at the wound but did not find anything, was I

There has been no mail since you went
away at all. I wonder how you are. I've col-
lected the letters they rec'd yesterday. You
must not forget to send their reply to me
as soon as you get it.

The Dr seems to be getting around quite
usually again, though he does not seem to
wish to read weather very much. It seems
to be unusual for his time of the year. I
was almost afraid it would freeze very
soon last night.
I expect to hear from you in the morning
and give you a kiss.
