I don't know what was in the air yesterday. You felt like the d—l, and when I tried to pull myself together to go up to the Everett & call on you, I simply could not do it without an effort that, with work ahead of me, I did not dare attempt. I was completely thrashed out, as I guess its my fate to be so long as I keep up this nervous work. Its all work,

there is a closer relation between work
and the emoluments thereof.

I wish you would confer on
my behalf with Moot regarding a
further payment for my work on '89.
We have no agreement that covers it,
and it will be a matter of judgement
largely; and while I should be per-
fectly willing to leave it to Moot's judg-
ment, I don't want him to think that
I am "leaving it to him" in any such
sense that he will feel compelled to
be generous rather than just. Whatever
you advise Moot will be satisfactory to
me. The original arrangement
was that my compensation should
depend on the amount of labor
required - I agreeing that it should
not exceed \$100. & Moot agreeing to pay
at least \$50. So it will turn on
whether I have had more or less
trouble than usual with the book.
I have already had \$50. on account.
