SOUTH ENGLISH, Iowa, Oct. 12.

—Politics have been running quite high for some time. Last week the democrats had a rally at Sigourney, they went as a delegation from this and other small towns in the north part of this county. When the procession reached Sigourney there were about fifty teams. Of course everything was quiet here until they returned in the evening, when they almost shouted themselves hoarse with their hurrahs for Cleveland....It was however reserved for the republicans to make the big show, which they did last Monday night at Sigourney also. He was one of our oldest and best citizens....Our township Sunday School convention meets here next Saturday and Sunday....The new Methodist minister, Mr. Potter, preached his first sermon at this place, September 30th.

WEST BURLINGTON.

GROWTH OF THE SCHOOLS—NEW BUILDINGS—MISCELLANEOUS.

WEST BURLINGTON, Oct. 12.—The increase of attendance at our school this fall has compelled the directors to prepare another room and hire a teacher. This necessitates the use of the whole building as the total enrollment is close upon two hundred pupils. Miss Carrie Ingram has been secured as the extra teacher. Several new buildings are being built this fall. Our town still maintains a steady growth....Owing to the heavy business now being moved on the "Q" the shops here are working fourteen hours a day in order to keep the rolling stock in good order....Rev. W. F. Moir, the nearly appointed Methodist minister to this

place, called on the board of trustees of the First Baptist Church of Burlington, tendered his resignation at a monthly meeting of the church last Saturday, asking to be relieved of his charge on the tenth of this month. For several months it has been pretty generally known that the doctor contemplated resigning the pastorate of the church, but his friends have been hopeful all along of dissuading him from doing so. The whole of the membership are unanimous in the expression of sorrow and regret at his leave-taking. Dr. Johnson has been in the ministerial service of the Baptist church for over forty years, and the city of Burlington and this portion of the state of Iowa has been the scene of many years of his work. In 1848 he left the theological seminary and removed to Burlington as a missionary of the Home Mission Society. Burlington at that time was a quite small village, containing only a few hundred people who had but very limited church advantages. Soon after the doctor's arrival he had succeeded in organizing a Baptist church with a dozen members, and two years after his advent here in building a church edifice and adding the names of about 800 more people to his congregation. In a couple of years more the Burlington Institute was located, the green brick home structure was erected, and the school opened. All under the young pastor's leadership. After serving in this city ten years as the pastor of the First Baptist Church and the head of the
