Mar. 12th 1884

My dear wife: I got home yesterday morning and dozed and slept all day and night. This morning I feel really rested and am going to work on the "Bystander" as soon as I get this off. I don't know when the crisis came in the "Bystander" - probably in the mail.

When that is done I am going to write a Leppincott story - or - part of one at least, before leaving on Thursday evening.

I find I cannot get away from Potsdam until Monday morning. So I cannot get to Williamsport much ahead of time. I have not fully traced my route

but I shall probably not be
able to go by Phila as I hoped
to do, but must go direct to
Wausport; thence by a cross road
to Allouan and thence to Cas-
selle. I guess I will then come
on and stay a little with you
if I can spend the time, unless
you will meet me at Wausport
and make the run with me.
That would perhaps be better,
As I shall have to come
back by Pittsburgh and there
is nothing for me to do
in Phila except to see
my loved ones. I will
write more fully, am so
glad you had a good
time at W -

My trunk is somewhere
- I do not know where
- but hope it is on the
road. Going cross-
ed - I look it, you
see could have not been
able to find an catch it
since.
