5. P.M.

My Darling:

I have just arrived and got your letter. You will have learned by my letters from Canton and Potsdam that I had given up all thought of your coming here. It has taken two solid days to get here: left Canton yesterday morning at 7 and staid last night at Syracuse leaving there at 6 this morning. I thought I would go by Cortlandt and see Ellen but found I could do better by the Fall Creek route so stopped at Syracuse. Should you be able as I trust you may, come to Harrisburg on the Harrisburg Express on Thursday and stop at the Selands

House. I will come on the 2.30. am
train and wake you with a kiss.

I do hope you will be able for I have been
counting the days till I should see you
again for a good while and am just
the hungriest lover you ever had. I
am sure we will have a happy time even
if we go back to the city the very next day.

Do not try to swim unless you are well
however, for I should be in mortal ter-
ror if I thought you risked anything in
that way.

I will not write any more now
as I have but little time and must
write some other letters. Give lots of love
to the dear daughter.
