I have delayed answering your letter of the 18th desiring to get full information in reference to the matter. I have seen a list of the original members of the Circumlocutionary Office and do not find the name of Robbins. Meyer Robbins, should he have been connected with the Army as an officer and served 3 years, or was an officer at the close of the war would have been entitled to membership, and although entitled to membership for some reason may not have joined the Society at its formation. Most of the states (I think all) however upon proof of service admit a dividend upon a payment of a certain sum equal to the original amount and interest. Should the list of members which I have seen be incorrect, and it could be proven that Meyer Robbins was an original member

The Judge would not be entitled to membership
(being a Collateral) if there is a descendant
in the direct line living.

The Society of the Circumlocution of Cones was long
since dissolved. The descendants of the original
members have taken steps to revive the Society
which will no doubt be done. They have a
meeting for this purpose, in Hartford I think,
the evening 4th of July.

gladly give you any information in addition.
