The value of what you have already written is fully appreciated and it is believed that your experience and observation will enable you to point out possible defects and superfluities, and assist thereby materially in the preparation of a set of schedules which will answer all requirements and elicit the information desired.

I shall be glad to have you make such suggestions and comments as may occur to you, at as early a date as may be convenient.

EXPLANATORY.

The schedule marked (A) shows items of Receipts classified by subjects, under four headings:

Ordinary Receipts.

Loans.

Sinking Funds.

Special Funds

Returns for the past ten years are asked for in this schedule, and it is intended to issue, in June, 1890, a second schedule showing the actual financial revenue at the end of the fiscal year which immediately precedes the taking of the Eleventh Census. The contents of these two schedules ought to make a complete showing from 1880, to 1890, and although it is more than likely that figures for the earlier years will not in every ease be forthcoming, yet a vast amount of valuable information will be made available for Census purposes:

The second schedule marked (B) calls for details of expenditures, the tables being arranged on a similar plan to that used for receipts. The information under the general heading of expenditures is classified as follows:
