Dear Sir & Comrade

I applied in May 1880 for a pension & after waiting three years my case was rejected. Hon E. B. Taylor went to the Pension Department to get them to reverse the decision & found that Col A. S. Hall had endorsed upon my resignation Accepted but disapproved as to the causes alleged. Stating that none of the disability of this officer was incurred in line of duty" I stated in my resignation, that when I ended the service I had a small ^{hardly visible} rupture upon my right side, & in the discharge of my duty I tore open that one & made a new one on my

left side & stirring me across
the kidneys which caused me
to resign. Now I talked with
Hall at the time I presented
my resignation & he said he
hated to lose ^{so} good an officer
but under the circumstances
he would accept of my resignation
& there wrote something on it &
then read to me. Accepted
but the Col Commanding
expressing his regrets at losing
so good & efficient an officer
I then sealed it up & I carried
it up to Gen Reynolds, & never
knew until Taylor learned
of it & told me in 1883 Had
I applied in proper season
I could have proven by Dr
Pauley all about my hurt
but I was like a good many
other soldiers I felt too patriotic

Now the reson of Col Halls
meaness & rascality & deplisity
was this, He had detailed to of Co
B's soldiers to attend his horses
one day the boys came down to
the Company's quarters & in the
course of conversation I said
that Col had ^{no} right to do that
& that they had better come down
& go to soldiering & I said further
that Col Hall would sacrifice
every soldier in the Regt if he
could get a Star on his shoulder
or be sent to Congress & after
Col had sealed up my resigna-
tion he asked me about it &
told him I had said it & I
would not take it back & we had
some words about the matter
& I left. Now Sir what I want
is to prove to the Pension Depart-
ment that Col Hall was

Capable of doing such
contemptible meanness &
did not hesitate to employ or
at all scrup^t to stoop to such
sordid, niggardly dishonorable
means to save himself from dis-
grace, or to injure a man if he
got at all displeased with him
I know judge that you have
cause to remember Col Hall &
know full well what kind of a
man he was & now sir I would
like to have you make affidavit
to his true characteristics & if
you know anything of his borrow-
ing 1200\$ of the Treasury of
Ashtabula for 3 days & then
refusing to pay him telling him
that if he ever said anything
about it he would put him
^{through} for loaning the money &c
If you can & will make

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affidavit to his true inaccuracy & send it to me at this place, you will confer a lasting favor upon an old man now past 62 years & one who has not a cent to help himself with, I am going down to Washington D C & beard the Lion in his den" & see if I can not remove the objections to granting me a pension -

I do not know where you reside but my son tells ^{my} to direct to Chicago Care of Inter Ocean & they will forward it to you
