Dear friend

I wonder if you have forgotten May Rudens, and I have often wondered if you wrote that letter you said you would. I think you did, and no doubt you have wondered why I did not answer it. The reason is, that I never got it as I left Denver 1 week after you did. Mrs Karl made up her mind that she needed a little exercise and she thought that a good way to get it would be to do her house work with the help of a girl 14 years old. That she said was living with her mother, so that left me to look for an other place, and as my sister was out of a place at the same time, we decided to get work at the same place if we could. We went to the mountain, and stayed there 3 months, from there we went to Wash. City. There I kept house for my brother until I got married, which was about 8 years ago, my sister went to San Francisco, where she got married, she has 2 children

and I have 4, 3 boys and 1 girl. We lived in Wash-
until about two years ago, when we moved to B.C.
We live on a farm, which with the children I enjoy
more than living in town, I have often thought of
writing to you, but not knowing where you were,
I have put it off, but the other day we got an adver-
tisement from the young companion, and among
the writers for 1890, I noticed M. Turgot's name,

is nearly gone now, I think I have written enough
for this time, not knowing whether you will ever get
it or not, so I will close with best regard to you and
