My Dear Mrs. Sawyer.

I am ashamed to write you - even in acknowledgement of all your kind services, because I have not obeyed your good advice to go to Washington, but I have placed the Judge's letters, and stand apprised upon the Senate Calendar.

It is now reported that Gaisam is the man whom they propose to put in my place, who advising that he has not voted the Republican ticket. I think Gaisam will come Tuesday - 18th. For 17 years.

I am ashamed to write you - even in acknowledgement of all your kind services, because I have not obeyed your good advice to go to Washington, but I have placed the Judge's letters, and stand apprised upon the Senate Calendar.

I think I stand safe, unless there may arise a conspiracy ^{except briefly.} through the Treasury Department, the details of which are too long to tell, I was appointed Custodian. Mr. Winslow that I am not the devil I have been painted to him, I
think the last note of danger would be past. I would like Mr. Winslow
to know that for good, honest work, I am always available, and only evang.
injustice and roguery puts me in condition to fight a buzz-saw.
