Dear Brother Alumnus:

We desire to call your attention to the approaching anniversary of our Alma Mater and to urge you to be present on that occasion.

In spite of the disappointment caused by the necessary absence of our new President, Dr. Hill, the attendance of the Alumni last year was very large, and we had by far the largest, livest and most enthusiastic Alumni meetings which your Committee have ever seen in Rochester.

We have planned for larger meetings and even more enthusiasm this year, and we look to you, brethren, to co-operate with your Committee in securing these ends. We believe our Association ought to be an important factor, a real power in the future of the institution, and we ask you to help make it so.

Dr. Hill will preside. He is a genial, whole-souled man, a splendid speaker, a most admirable teacher, a man of broad and progressive policy. You will have the best possible opportunity to see, hear, and know him. Come, and by your presence pledge your support to the new administration. Its plans and policy will be outlined, and you will be deeply interested in hearing what has been done and what it is proposed to do to keep the University in the front rank of American colleges.

Your Committee have another announcement to make, which they feel will powerfully appeal to every son of Rochester. It has been decided to postpone the regular "oration and poem" before the Alumni, and substitute a Eulogy, the theme of which shall be The Character and Work of Martin B. Anderson. This address will be delivered by Geo. Dana Boardman, D.D., LL.D., of Philadelphia, President of the International Peace Society. Dr. Boardman was Dr. Anderson's pastor during the period of "storm and stress" when the foundations of the University were being laid, and has been his life-long intimate friend. You may be absolutely certain that his treatment of this great theme will be scholarly, sympathetic, discriminating, eloquent, in short worthy, in every respect, of that superb personality whose image is enshrined in the heart of every alumnus.

No alumnus can afford to miss hearing this final tribute, which this gifted and eloquent man will pay to the character and work of the "Prince of college presidents".

The eulogy will be delivered on Tuesday evening, June 17th, at the beautiful new Lyceum Theatre, where all the Commencement exercises will be held. The meeting of the Alumni Association will be held Wednesday morning, in the Laboratory Building, and will be followed by the Alumni Dinner at Anderson Hall.
