Dear Sir:

Please accept my thanks for your bold and truthful notes in the *Inter Ocean* (Aug. 21) in letter to the U.S. Senate. I am 40 yrs. old. I lived, when a boy in a democratic village. I was a democrat then. I spent much time with a friend on a farm who was a Lincoln boy, as we called each other. My boy friend was a reader. I read the accounts of Abraham Lincoln and heard about the poor slave. My friend told me various stories of history. I read more, saw the Lincoln party had in it men who were quite different men from those around me who were democrats. I changed my politics at once. Though all the boys of my age and the village were Douglas boys.

I saw something good in the Lincoln party. Since I have grown to manhood I have expressed that goodness by saying that our party <sup>is a party</sup> of patriotism, intelligence, morality and in favor of freedom in everything that every individual citizen should enjoy consistent to the maintenance of popular government. I saw that the amendments to the constitution confirmed my early judgement. I never dreamed that I should live to see a congress that would refuse to furnish the necessary legislation to enforce those amendments. — especially a republican congress — but I am afraid I shall. I know young men in this town, whose parents are democrats, when they came to vote voted the republican ticket for the reason that wanted to be with the party of intelligence, progress and patriotism. A party of free speech, free vote, free schools.

Now I am almost not a republican if the elements of greatness of which we boast

have left us or as a party we have not the stamina to stand up and fight for what has cost so much.

I hope you will continue in the same aggressive and consistent manner in which you have discussed things of such vital importance.
