

Phila. Oct. 1<sup>st</sup> 1890

Dear Mrs. Tourgee,

Your letter of Sept. 19<sup>th</sup> received, and I fully expected to answer it in day or two, but I have been so pressed for time, it seems every minute day & night was taken up, & that I found it impossible to devote any time to writing, until today. In reference to letter of questions sent to my brother, we could very readily see the necessity of such, before anything could be done for him. The questions were answered and sent to the Judge last week. He also enclosed his discharge, thinking perhaps it would throw more light,

and be a guide for finding  
two facts about my brother's  
life in the War. My brother  
has met some <sup>members</sup> of the company  
that he was in, that remember  
about his illness, & are ready  
to testify to the same. If the  
discharge will not be a help  
will you kindly return it to  
me.

I saw Lodie last week & on  
Sabbath we had the pleasures  
of her company for dinner  
which we enjoyed very much.  
She is looking & feeling very  
well; & expects to spend  
tomorrow evening with her.  
We are going out to hunt  
a cabin ~~with~~ this week, that  
will look as well & be as good  
as one that we could procure  
here, and at a lower price.

We also expect to find a  
new dressmaker.

The weather here is simply de-  
lightful. I trust that you  
& the Judge are both well.
