Dana Morse " "

Alfred G. Sturgis " "

Alvin S. Wilcox " "

Above named were students at Kingsville from Wayne with the exception of Morse who resided just over the line in Cherry Valley, and went there with us.

In the same company, and at the same time.

Justus H Woodburn, and William D. Woodburn went from Kingsville. Perhaps, (and I think there were) others with whom I was not personally acquainted.

This regt is credited as follows:

" This regt was organized at

" Camp Chase O in May

" and June - 62 to serve 3 mos

" - it was mustered out Sept 20

" 62 - after having served about a

" month longer than its term of

" enlistment

They were mustered in June 10th

They left Kingsville to enlist May 29

" The 85th was mustered in

" June 10th to serve 3 mos.

" mustered out Sept 23 - after the 27th

" on the expiration of its term of service

" The 86th mustered in June 10

" " out Sept 28

" as above (term expired)

" The 87th mustered in June 10

" " out Oct 1st to 4th

" as above

" The 88th mustered in June 26

" " out Sept 26

as above

I remember there was a

sudden excitement which

nearly broke up the schools
and have always supposed
there was a call for 3 mos
troops at the time, which
caused the raising of so
many 3 mos regts at that
time, for I knew previously
the troops had been 3 year
men, since the call for
75000. By referring to my
journal. "May 27⁶² War news
exciting" " " 28. All excitement
and the boys are going" "May 29th The
boys went to Lichtabula to take train"
I did not go with them because
my parents would not consent
Now Comrade if you have
the time, someday tell me
what "Call", if any, they enlisted
under

of the reunion, as any
I ever attended. You
was with, and in command
of, the squad which ret'd to
the regt from Danville
Ky Nov 62. I remember
while the train stopped
a while one morning,
your taking the Corbett
out of a Kentucky gent,
at "Chickens". I felt sorry
for the poor fellow for
he took it to heart.

Being beaten so thoroughly
and quickly by a "Yank"
was unlooked for by him
The past is too big to recall
now so with kindest wishes
I bid you goodbye
