Thirty-Sixth Annual Convention to be
held in Buffalo, July 13-15, 1892

THE PROGRAM of the Annual Convention of the New York Press Association is outlined below. The responses from members promise a large attendance. The special efforts of President Butler ensure a meeting of unusual interest and profit. The business program in fullness and variety and practical character should satisfy the most insatiate advocate of "work" at these conventions. The entertainment program, briefly sketched, will be filled in by the master hand of the President, to the perfect satisfaction of those who see no sin in "play," who know no waste of time "in pleasure's lap carest."

WEDNESDAY, JULY 13.—Opening session in Concert Hall, Academy of Music, at 10 o'clock a. m. The entire day will be devoted to business according to program given, and there will be such other business sessions as may be appointed by the President.

THURSDAY.—The "order of the day" will be announced on Wednesday. It will include a visit to Niagara Falls with dinner at the International Hotel; a ride about the City of Buffalo; Pain's Spectacular entertainment in the evening.
