Dear Sir;

Enclosed find a clipping from
the "Waycross (Ga.) Herald" of April 22, 1893.

This county (Hamilton) is one of the most bitter
Bourbon counties in this state tho' with a fair
count and honest vote it would be safely
Republican there being many white men in
the county who are Republicans in belief. Since
my residence here ~~there~~ (five or six years) there
have been many negroes killed by white men
but no ^{white man} ~~has~~ ever been prosecuted for
killing a "dead nigger". I am a white man
a Republican and on account of my political
belief I have been bull-dozed, bay-coated and
even stabbed. Such matters are common
tho' all over the South and far worse in
Ga. and many other Southern states than
in Fla. The reason for this difference in my
opinion is on account of so many tourists
^(over)

coming to this state from the North, to spend
the winter. The Bourbons know that if they
carry their outrages with too high a hand
that it would be like killing the goose that
laid the golden egg.
