thank you for giving me the exceedingly interesting details concerning your dear Father & Mother. While it was far from being my intention to pry impertinently into your sacred private interests or gain any statement concerning them I cannot express my pleasure and deep interest and appreciation derived from the sad yet comforting recital which so fully confirms my estimate of your Mother's character based on the notice in Trouader; Well may you miss and lament & mourn the loss of such a Mother & Father. My tears of mingled sympathy & joy scarcely allowed me read it, ah, how it gladdens me to learn of your noble Father's interest & efforts for the Lord's little ones, the

oppressed & your Mothers in like manner
but while you weep for your loss the remem-
berance of what the love & the grace of God
enabled them thus to be & to do causes tears
of joy to mingle with the sorrow ; It would
have given me unspeakable pleasure to
have known, greeted & labored & suffered
with such a man as your Father.

I wonder not that he could not understand
the white Southern Baptists for to myself
it is the most amazing spectacle under the
Sun, who can understand them except thus,
that they even most of all are most fully
in the condition of hypocritical Pharisees
'blind leaders of the blind', of whom the
Master says 'let them alone'. My Father
was threatened and barely escaped with
his life on several occasions while living
near Clarksville Tenn in 67 & 8 for
reasons virtually similar to incidents you give.
Indeed your recital brings up so vividly

the dreadful effects & incidents of the years
since 61 on my own Father & his family &
my own, of my companion suddenly removed &
dead to rest 5 years ago at Nashville & only
one sister left whose husband is the man
of whom I wrote as saying concerning the
Negroes "oh, kill em all off" that I am
constrained to confess that the tears which
blurred my eyes were partly for my
own loved ones, my own woes & of anguish
and shame that some of my kindred
have acted so unworktily, so differently
from your parents & even from my own

All these things it seems to me should lead
us to more zealous efforts, more earnest
crying to God on behalf of the oppressed
and for mercy, truth, justice in all the earth
so that when we depart we may leave
a memorial like that of your loved parents
