Dear Sir

I recently read your  
letter in Saturday Afternoon  
& in ~~the~~ last Saturday paper  
& see you quote a letter from  
a man who styles himself an  
Iowa Republican, judging from  
the initials, & think he is one  
of that class of Republicans, who  
was helped for us as Iowa  
Democratic Governor. I write  
that he repeats the usual lie  
used by Anti-Protection Republicans  
viz. Iowa is a good Republican  
State. Now I want to say  
that Iowa never was a good  
Republican State, I argued  
and show that clearly, but

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that much majority. About  
about 1878 or so before  
the Republican Party took up  
the question of Temperance  
we had a Republican Governor  
who was a minority - or  
that we did not receive  
a majority - of all the votes  
cast. Now I think the Abolition  
question had more to do in  
giving us a Democratic Governor  
than Prohibition, and I want  
to say to you, that it will be a  
rough day for Republicans in  
this state, when they do not hear  
the language of their conviction  
of putting back on Prohibition  
I agree with you entirely, that  
the Republican party has been beaten  
in the Nation when it has been

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Too cowardly to stand  
up for what is right & true.  
I am glad to see you standing  
up as you do for the Negro &  
showing up the reason why  
the Republican Party has been  
beaten. It seems to me that  
the Republican Party deserved  
& has been beaten last fall  
because it did not take a more  
courageous stand for human  
rights & justice. Republican Pro-  
hibitionists even held meetings  
in line in this state last fall, on  
the plea, that it was a State  
election, but it went to show  
the party leaders to ignore the  
question this fall - I hope  
the "Bytewards" will continue the fight  
in the coming November. If  
it takes time all summer
