Dear Sir:--

On August 14, the Congress on Africa meets in Chicago. So I ask leave to call your attention again to Pres. Bonney's rulings: "Addresses and essays must not exceed 7500 words. 'Copy' of the address or the essay must be written in English, or be translated into English before sending it to Chicago. It must also be either in type-writing or in print before being handed to the secretary. The MS. of each speech or of each essay ought to be put into the hands of the secretary of the Congress on Africa not later than August 1 at the outside." There is still another reason why it is highly desirable for each speaker or each writer to forward the MS of his speech or paper at his earliest convenience, viz., to facilitate as much as possible the speedy publication of the volume containing these African articles. If every speaker and every writer will send the MS of his speech or of his essay in season to reach me on August 12 at the latest, I can send them all to a publisher on August 23. But the failure of a single speech or essay to arrive will delay publication, perhaps for months.
