My dear Sir:

I examined the Judgment Roll in the case of your observed, Lumber - Chumney Judd vs Frank D. Moore, and have this report to make in reply to your inquiries:

- 1- The Affidavit of service of summons is in the usual form; is made by Walter Record, who certifies that he personally served "the annexed summons" on the defendant, ~~the~~ by reading the same to him, "in the hall of his home, No. 200 Swan Street, Buffalo, N. Y. ~~and~~ on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of April, 1891."

And that he personally knows him to be the person named &c.

There is no record of any service of the complaint. J. G. Record, Plff's Atty, furnishes the usual affidavit of non-appearance, swearing that the summons was served as above but does not mention any service of complaint.

The case was referred to B. E. Furness, an Atty of Buffalo, who reports, finding that Moore had induced the Plaintiff to loan him \$100 - on May 26<sup>th</sup> 1890, in Phila. Pa., by claiming to

have money on deposit in German National  
(or German Savings) Bank in the city  
of Buffalo. I am not now certain as to  
the name of the bank; my accounts say "National"  
but I have an impression the report says "Savings".  
(I will look again if it is material.) That Def  
had no money on deposit at that time  
in said Bank and such representation  
was false and fraudulent, Judgment \$105.81
