My dear Sir:-

We have missed the Bystander's notes from the Inter Ocean. Since you first commenced their publication, your articles have been read with interest and I hope you will soon resume your notes.

I have also hoped that the N. C. A. would have before this time crystallized into such form as to become an active political force.

It certainly seems important that good citizens who believe in the protection of the rights of citizenship in the United States, and in a free ballot and an honest count, should get ready to defend the right. The last November election turned us back twenty five years, and the political future looks darker in some respects than at the outbreak of the rebellion.

The late rebels are now in control, and with their Sammam Albion, are a power for mischief whose dangerous possibilities are almost incalculable.

And our politicians do not seem to appreciate the gravity of the situation.

The danger of the repeal of the tariff on wool counts for more with them, than the bloody murders of colored citizens in the South, and they care more for the protection of the tin plate industry than they do for the protection of the ballot box.

Will you please inform me what is the present condition, and what are the future prospects of the N.C.R.A. If it could develop strength to publish a paper, it would soon become a good fighting organization.
