Dear Sir

A bronchial attack, in addition to other infirmities has compelled me to suspend canvassing for the N.C. and all labors away from home, and as actual subscribers are the kind most needed & enclose the list of names obtained, to whom the N.C. is to be sent, if published, except in the case of F.A. Powers, who said he did not want it; should not read it if he had it, himself, but would pay for it one year for any person I would select & I choose to have it not for any one person but to the Norwalk Young Men's Reading Room & Library Association, which please note. Two of the others payment is somewhat conditional and may fall on myself. A few others might have subscribed if they could see & liked the paper, one of

whom gave me his name as a member of the
N. C. R. Avia E. A. Bray, with stamp for
certificate. It is an uphill business
to get in a new paper, especially without
the paper to shew for itself. Most of
our Republicans are taking a number of
papers, many, more than they can read; one
told me he took 17 & all plead the hard
times; The obstacles are many & excuses are
easy to find, to those who want them.

Well, Ohio has spoken unmistakably
on the tariff question; how much and
what kind of pinching & experience will
make her speak as clearly & emphatically
on injustice, fraud, oppression & suppression
of majority rule by & in the South.

And New York has shewn that Tammany
& Southern methods may be carried too far
& such doses as Maynard prove too nu-
-reating to be swallowed. And so all
over the North.

Bad as things are even here, well may we rejoice & bless God for the many great differences in favor of the North, in comparison with the South, that, like a great mill-stone, hangs about the Nation's neck, threatening its very existence & clogging its prosperity and clouding its reputation.
