Dear Judge:--

Yours of the 26th just received. As I read it the thought came to me that it was not quite fair to you to ask you to give up the contract with the Buffalo paper on no more definite arrangements than was outlined in my letter to you. I said so to Mr. Nixon and he agreed with me. He suggested that you continue your arrangement with the Buffalo paper and furnish us the same letter or another one, as you please, each week, and let this arrangement hold good until it proves unsatisfactory to one party or the other. In other words Mr. Nixon withdraws his objection to your duplicating letters to the Buffalo paper, or to your furnishing letters to the Buffalo paper.
