some pictures which I did not see among
your Contributions - The Field Staff & some
pictures ought to be in the book and
Major Perkins also - I am inclined to think
it was taken in 1863 when he was home on
account of his Chickamauga wound -
The other fellow was 1st Sear & Adjutant
and I send simply that you may lay it along
side one you have of the 1st Sear of
Co. G. in order ^{that} your good wife may see
she did not get the only handsome
man in the 10<sup>5th. If you have
the Sorkaus picture and Major engraved
you can retain for that purpose but
when you have satisfied Mrs. Burgess of
the truth in regard to my foregoing statement
please return it.</sup>

I do not deem it essential of course

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that your forthcoming history should be but ~~there~~
with details but it might add zest if you related
in your own way the following episode.

The Regiment went into the field without either the
State or National Colors. At the time of the Grand
Review in Louisville Gen. Cassill found the Serpent
bearing the State banner of the 101st Indiana
lying by the roadside - took his banner away
from him and gave it to "A" Company 100th
I. I. to be retained by it until such time as he
should order it restored. (poor devil was ~~sent back~~
& I suppose). It was enveloped in a black
oil cloth sheet and was never ~~unfurled~~
except to look at. Sergt Charles Carreen
when we left Danville and through the battle
of Perryville (The Slaughter of the innocents)
- Gen. will remember the 101st Ind. were not there
but if we had had that flag had the 101st
would have been disgraced & he carried
it in the black bag the Colonies (if they saw it)
must have thought we were traitors but we

were not. After we arrived at Memphis
I will be beyond the pale of giving orders
Col. Diller sent the Col of the 101st a note by
the hand of William ^{of Co K} ~~Far~~ ^{others} ~~son~~ ^{son} ~~son~~
as "J" informing him of his intention to return
- The note can be seen when ~~entering~~ ^{leaving}
proper answer made ~~and~~ ^{the} ~~same~~ ^{return}
We did not receive our Colons until some time
after - at Memphis I think - I can do
detail of other names - I remember Sergt.
Gunter who lasted through the war and still
lives and Corp John E. Watrous of Co K -

By the way - See Halle's report
he says as I insisted to you - "The Regiment
"formed on the left" of the McNeill Pike

Pardon me for having added so
much to the mass of interesting
stuff already thrust upon you
