Dear Madam:-

Mr. Frick has sent me your letter of the 23rd for answer. As nearly as I can make out from the little sketch which you sent him your idea is to have the markers only 6 inches wide and 4 inches thick and about 6 inches high above ground. Now, of course, we can make these markers this way or in fact any way that you wish, but they would be entirely too small for the monument like that you are to erect. Then, too, they would cost nearly as much as larger ones.

I would think that a very suitable marker to go with this monument would be like the sketch which you sent, square top with a little bevel around the edge and have the markers certainly 8 inches thick and I think 8 inches would be better and not less than 14 inches wide, and if the width was 16 inches I believe it would be better than 14, and then about one foot high above ground.

As I do not see anything in your letter to Mr. Frick or in his to me as to how many markers will be needed I will not quote you price until I hear from you again. If you will let me know as to your idea of the sizes which I have suggested and also tell me what other more than one marker will be wanted I will, by return mail, quote you price.
