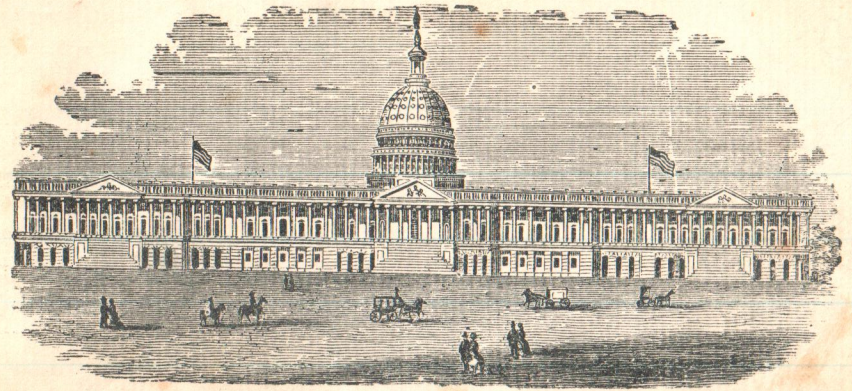


I like to for get to let
